


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Overview

In May of 2023, HBM Architects LLC was selected to design the new Main Library and Operations Center. Community and stakeholder engagement was identified as a crucial step in the design process. In September, the design team worked with Stark Library to provide several in-person activity sessions and online survey opportunities for members of the staff, public, and project stakeholders to provide input. These engagement activities gave participants an opportunity to share their thoughts and encouraged creative thinking about the potential for the project. The activities consisted of the following:

Mind Breaking

Participants learned about spaces and features for a library that may be different from what they currently have or less conventional that what they are familiar with. They were asked to record their reactions, both positive and negative, to what they saw. This activity was held in-person.

World Cafe

Participants collaborated in small groups to respond to questions about how the Library can better look to the future and increase interaction with the downtown community Questions were placed at tables around the room and groups were given 5 minutes to respond to each question. At the end of the session, responses were shared with all attendees to discuss the future and impact of the Main Library.

Staff Surveys

Online surveys were sent to Stark Library staff (both from Main Library and across the system) to gain an understanding of what works well in the current Main Library, what could use improvement, and the role of the Main Library in the system.

TomTod Mind Breaking

Participants from the TomTod group learned about the types of spaces and features that make a library unique. They were asked to record their reactions, both positive and negative, to what was shown. This activity was held in-person and in addition to sharing images with the group, tactile material samples were also shared.

MKSK Work Session

Stakeholders provided feedback on courtyard gardens, roof terraces, outdoor furniture, art and sculpture, the arrival experience, connecting with Market Street, connecting with the Cleveland Avenue Park, and incorporating historical influences. This combined with a process of research and analysis that together inspired programming ideas.

In-Person Mind Breaking Sessions

Four in-person Mind Breaking sessions were held at Stark Main Library. "Mind Breaking" is intended to encourage participants to think differently about what a public library can look like and provide. In these sessions, HBM Architects presented attendees with images of innovative, less-conventional, library spaces and features organized into different categories. Participants were asked to make note of their reactions to the images they saw and post their thoughts on corresponding boards around the room.

A Note on the Recording of Responses

In order to organize and present the many collected comments from this activity into a comprehensive and informative document, some liberties were taken to editing and/or breaking up the original language of reactions in order to consolidate like minded opinions and make longer responses more concise. There were many respondents and not every comment was able to be featured in this book, but efforts were taken to capture the intention and meaning of all reactions. An "other" category was added to capture miscellaneous or general comments about the project.







Gathering Input From Library Staff

Collecting staff input is an invaluable resource in designing a new library. Staff members are the most familiar with how the library functions, which spaces need the most attention and improvement, and what is currently working and should be maintained. Responses were collected from 37 staff members, and the answers to each question are reflected in the following pages. If more than one staff member provided a similar response, the frequency of their answers was noted.

Surveys provided to Main Library staff also asked about the specific needs of their department and desired adjacencies. This will help our understanding of how to program the spaces in the new Main Library and Operations Center buildings.

Surveys were also provided to staff across the system, giving them to bring their experience to the table and respond to questions regarding the role of the Main Library both in the system and in the downtown community.





This way, we could reach out to local museums and historians and offer to display their items on a temporary basis, teaching the public about them, and could guarantee some level of safety with the items behind locked glass.











- We are an important part of the library but are often overlooked and unrecognized for our contributions. This is emphasized by the lack of care given to the design and aesthetic needs of our current department.
- I want the operations center to be treated more like a branch than say an Amazon Warehouse where function is prioritized over form. I want to feel good in the space and look forward to spending forty hours there every week. Achieve a better balance of form and function, and I will be SO grateful!:)
- · Photovoltaic panels on the roof, please.
- Install staff access doors with better/stronger closers so that weather and relative air pressure do not leave doors unlatched.
- A parking entrance off 8th St would allow some staff to avoid a dangerous blind left turn onto Cleveland Ave, as Heggy's obstructs the view. Or put in one of those domed mirrors on the NW corner.

 - Put children's/YA on one floor and all adult departments, including AV, genealogy, and the MakerSpace, on the other.
 - I think the current set up we have works. First floor being adult and children's circulation while the upstairs is dedicated to computers, business, and other services of that nature.
- · Adult materials should be together x2
 - Keep fiction and non-fiction books close together, not on separate floors. Serendipity in searching sometimes causes both to be needed for a topic or an author. Having them on separate floors makes browsing more difficult and can discourage patrons from finding everything we have
- It would make sense to have the children's department on the same floor as where parents are browsing.
- · A library maker studio near computers

- · Reference and check-out near the entrance
- I would suggest going to "One Desk" for the Reference / Adult Services / Circulation.
- · Adult services and computers/business center
- I would also design the public computer space radially like an amphitheater with the reference and/or business services desk at the focus.

If I could add one thing to the library to surprise and delight our patrons, it would be...

- A cozy fireplace, perhaps double-sided depending upon where it was located, with soft-seating/reading area. x2

Other comments / suggestions regarding the Main Library building

- The space needs to be more flexible to allow for growth and service changes.
- Shorter shelves with softer lighting, everything on wheels & space specific for larger programs.
- Use some wood for a warmer "feel."
- Have multiple desks at entry points for different functions.
- · Bring the books close to the front.
- Have staff available to go into the stacks with patrons who don't know how to search.
- · Photovoltaic panels on the roof, please.
- The lobby area should be shrunk from how it currently is. It takes "too long" to get from the front door to wherever a patron is headed. When originally designed, there were more needs for the size of lobby we have, but those needs have changed as time has passed. Making more room for the actual services and features of the library outweighs the need for sizable entrances.

- More windows, and maintain the high ceilings. Aside from Children's and the Atrium, our current design offers limited natural light. I believe it would be a more inviting space with walls of windows.
- Install staff access doors with better/stronger closers so that weather and relative air pressure do not leave doors unlatched.
- A fully enclosed courtyard would be an effective way of enlarging the space without having to heat, cool, or secure it, among having a beautiful space for a reading garden.
